The Executive Board wishes to share the results from Survey #2 regarding the Transfer Fee and Club issues:

We had 127 respondents (43% of households)

Which of the transfer fee structures presented would you support?

- 39.4% favored the up to 1% of the sale price or \$9k, with the fee-paying club activation fee and overage going to POA
- 33.1% favored the fee up to .5% of the sales price and funds going only to POA
- 27.6% would not support any type of transfer fee

Would you support terminating the RMA with the Club?

- 37.8% said yes
- 29.1% said no
- 35.4% said they needed more info

Would you work to help the communication/education effort surrounding the transfer fee?

- 30.7% said yes
- 70.1% said no

If we're not able to terminate the RMA, would you view the transfer fee as a viable method to support POA funding?

- 65.4% said yes
- 34.6% said no

THE ELK MIGRATION AT IRONBRIDGE

Every fall and early winter the Ironbridge fairways and riverfront become the perfect setting for hundreds of elk that make their way from the high country to lower elevations. They stay until sometime in the spring depending on weather conditions, food availability, and their migration patterns. Typically, they return to higher elevations in the spring and summer months as snow melts and vegetation becomes more abundant. The exact timing can differ from year to year.

RIVER CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

This is taken from the April 2023 Newsletter to share again with the community.

Colorado Gold Medal Waters: Our Roaring Fork River is one of 11 rivers within Colorado that has been designated as a "Gold Medal" water. What this means is that the Colorado Parks and Wildlife have designated it as such due to its consistency in producing trout standing stock of at least 60 pounds per acre and produces an average of at least 12 "quality trout" (14+ inches) per acre. Gold Medal water designation can only be applied to waters that are accessible for fishing by the general angling public. River segments must be at least 2 miles in length and lakes must be a minimum of 50 acres. Currently, 11 different rivers and three lakes account for nearly 325 miles of Colorado's Gold Medal waters.

The portion of the Roaring Fork River that is considered a Gold Medal Water begins at the confluence with the Fryingpan River and Roaring Fork River and continues for 22 miles until the Roaring Fork joins the Colorado River in Glenwood Springs. Typically, swift currents make float fishing preferable for many anglers, but there is wade fishing access surrounding boat ramps at the Bob Terrell State Wildlife Area near Carbondale and the Sam Caudill/West Bank SWA upstream of Glenwood Springs, and small pockets within the town itself. Many hardy brown and rainbow trout can be found in this stretch,



along with mountain whitefish.

Colorado Gold Medal Waters provide great spots to catch healthy and large trout. The Roaring Fork River has some special fishing regulations and rules for different sections of the river including regulations on catch and release areas, use of flies and lures, fish size, and other rules/guidelines that can be found on the Colorado Park & Wildlife website

Most anglers agree that the months of March and July offer the best fishing of the year. The low, clear flows of late winter and early spring combined with the first mayfly hatches of the year give float fishermen a chance to catch the giants that hide out on the bottom of the river throughout most of the year. Once the high flows subside and the water regains its clarity, bugs begin to hatch, and fly fishermen return to the river's edge. Late June and early July usually mark the beginning of the Fork's fly-fishing season and this is when the epic Green Drake hatch starts. Both float fishermen and wade fishermen can participate in the Green Drake hatch, but because much of the Roaring Fork flows over private property, fishing access is limited for walk-in anglers. As summer progresses, flows drop significantly, and water temperatures on the lower stretches of the river rise. August and even early September can bring difficult fishing down low, forcing anglers to share the limited access on the upper and middle sections of the river. It is always a good idea to carry a thermometer while you fish and to keep your boat, feet and flies out of water warmer than about 68 degrees Fahrenheit.

National Canvas and Local Strokes

Nationally, the real estate landscape, as per Mike Simonson of Altos Research, remains tentatively optimistic. The Federal Reserve's pause on rate changes, with potentially three cuts looming later this year, sets a stage where buyers could face increased competition amidst tightening inventory.

Lower interest rates might spur buyer demand further, potentially supporting continuously rising prices. Conversely, increased rates, though unlikely, could lead to faster-growing inventory this spring, and temper price increases.

Amidst a 20% national inventory increase, some areas in Florida representing the fastest

growing inventories have surged ahead with close to 50% increase over last year, contrasting a much more modest growth in the West. Activity-wise, there's a 15% national increase in contracts last month over last year, with days on the market holding steady and median home prices nudging up by 2%.

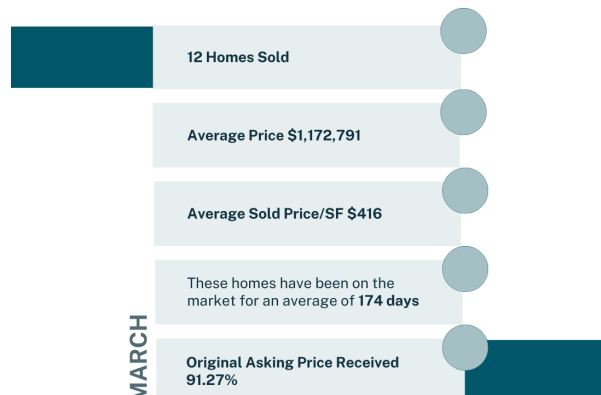
Distinctive Dynamics of Glenwood Springs and Carbondale

Glenwood Springs, with a 20% year-over-year inventory drop and a 10% uptick in median list prices, remains a stronghold for sellers. Conversely, Carbondale exhibits a more stable inventory, with a notable 20% rise in median home prices to nearly \$3 million this spring, influenced heavily by high-end listings in RVR and Aspen Glen.

Ironbridge Market Snapshot

There are currently **two homes under contract** and **six for sale**. Check out the very special location of **406 River Bend Way** which was offered for sale only a few weeks ago. **97 Blue Heron Drive** is offered at \$1.295 million, finished construction in 2022, and is one of three new listings offered for sale. The home was initially sold in 2021 at \$640,000.00.

The owners of **1820 River Bend Way** closed on their new construction home in August of 2022 purchasing the home for close to \$1.4 million. The home has not been lived in yet and is offered with a landscaping credit at the full asking price of \$2.1 million.

And **1817 River Bend Way** is offered at \$2.195 million - the construction is now complete at this wonderful custom home with landscaping to be completed in April.

Glenwood Springs Market Highlights

A closer examination of sales in Glenwood Springs unveils **12 homes changing hands** over the last 30 days at an average price of \$1,172,791.00 with the average sold price per square foot at \$416. Homes stayed on the market for an average of 174 days, while the sales price received was 91.27% of the original asking price.

Glenwood Springs showcases a more pronounced seller's market with a **Market Action Index (MAI) of 45**, indicating continued strong demand for relatively quick sales compared to the limited inventory. The median list price is \$1,580,000 for single-family homes, which almost to the dollar matches the county's median list prices this month.

The combined single-family, condo, and townhome **inventory in Glenwood Springs** is up 25% month over month, representing an increase that is expected and needed at this time of the year. It is however significant to point out that we have 20% fewer homes for sale in Glenwood than we had at the same time last year.

Glenwood Springs January
Local Market Update

The real-time market profile for **Glenwood Springs** shows a median price of new listings at \$845,000 and an average price per square foot of \$475.

Properties are staying on the market for an average of 82 days, with the median at 35 days, a remarkable drop from last month as various homes that stayed on the market over the fall and winter **sold last month**. These figures depict a market where high-value homes are selling at a steady pace, with only 8% of all properties that have taken a price decrease since coming to the market - in a balanced market about 35% of all homes offered for sale take a price reduction before sales.

Contrasting Glenwood Springs and

Garfield County

While Glenwood Springs holds as a strong seller's market, the wider **Garfield County** presents a more balanced scenario with an MAI of 37, indicating a slight seller's advantage. The county's median list price stands at \$1,590,000, with new listings coming in at a median of \$1,390,000, showing quite a bit of growth from last month which indicates there are more higher-priced homes coming to the market than homes on the lower end of the price scale.

Forward Outlook

As we step into the promising spring market, the data underscores the dynamic nature of our local real estate sectors. Ironbridge's beautiful offerings and Glenwood Springs' strong market performance paint an advantageous picture for sellers, while buyers are finding strategic opportunities amidst new listings, particularly in the **Colorado River Valley from New Castle to Rifle**.
