- One more email survey will be sent out to determine whether to continue pursuing a real estate Transfer Fee as a revenue option to potentially lower POA dues and avoid assessments.
- Be on the lookout for a reminder of guidelines for how to properly maintain the water drainage on your property. Remember that this is the owner's responsibility.

- If you received a late notice regarding your dues payment it could be that your recurring payment setup has expired and will automatically deactivate. To correct this, log in to your portal account and update your recurring payment to show "infinite payments".

RULES & REGULATIONS

SPEEDING:

Spring has sprung, summer is right around the corner and the kids will be out of school soon. That means more activity on our streets... children, dogs, bicycles, scooters, walkers, runners etc. It is very important for every driver to obey the speed limit and to be aware of who is sharing the road. The Ironbridge IPOA Rules and Regulations state: "The speed limit throughout the neighborhood is 17 miles per hour.

Anyone caught speeding will be subject to fines." To remind drivers there are several speed bumps and signage throughout the community. Let's keep Ironbridge safe. Please obey the rules of the road!

RENTAL LEASES:

Some homeowners have inquired about the rules surrounding rentals in Ironbridge.

The Ironbridge IPOA Rules and Regulations state:

1. All rental leases are subject to the Covenants and Rules and Regulations of the Association. Any failure to comply with the above will be a default under the lease. Owners are responsible for giving tenants a copy of the rules and regulations, and for notifying the Association with names and phone numbers of new tenants.
2. Occupancy of each dwelling unit on the Property shall be limited to no more than two



principal adults and the legal dependents of one or both of said principal adults, and occasional guests.

3. Leases must be in writing and for a term of no less than 6 months. Rental use as a VRBO or Air BNB are not permitted. (Per Garfield County, short-term rentals are not permitted in a PUD).

The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, **June 4th, at 5:00 at 1102 River Bend Way**. All residents are welcome.



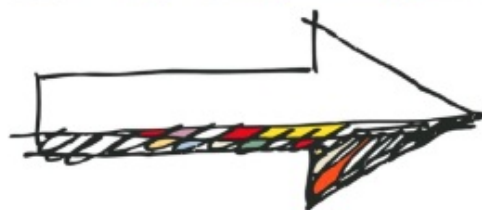

RIVER CONSERVATION COMMITTEE



The Ironbridge Homeowners Association (IPOA) owns 7.11 acres that were placed into a conservation easement in December 1998 by its predecessor owner, Rose Ranch. This property is located on the east side (across the river from our community) of the Roaring Fork River in the northeast portion of our IPOA. The property is referred to as "Heron Point" and is one of fifteen conservation easements held by the Roaring Fork Conservancy.

Sandwiched between the Cattle Creek Confluence Easement and the Roaring Fork River, the Heron Point Easement contributes to 1.25 continuous miles of riverside protection. Heron Point serves its namesake by providing critical habitat and nesting sites for the Great Blue Heron within the towering cottonwood stands. Bald eagles, woodpeckers, and swallows are among the bird species that accompany the great blue heron, while active beavers continue to contribute to a healthy wetland understory.

Roaring Fork Conservancy's mission is to "inspire people to explore, value, and protect the Roaring Fork Watershed." One way that Roaring Fork Conservancy strives to accomplish this mission is by protecting and preserving critical habitat throughout the watershed. Placing a conservation easement on a piece of property ensures the land will not be developed. More information on the Heron Point easement and other Roaring Fork River easements can be

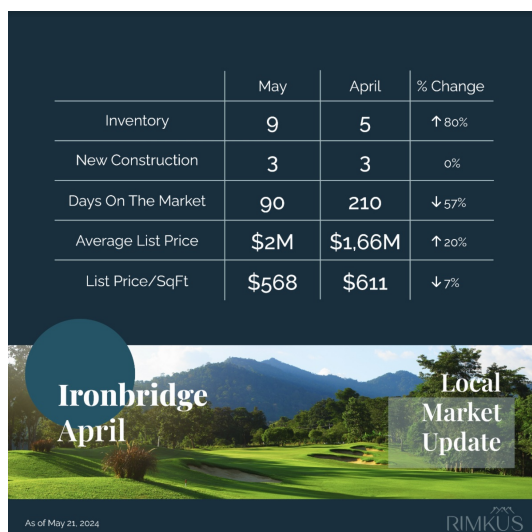
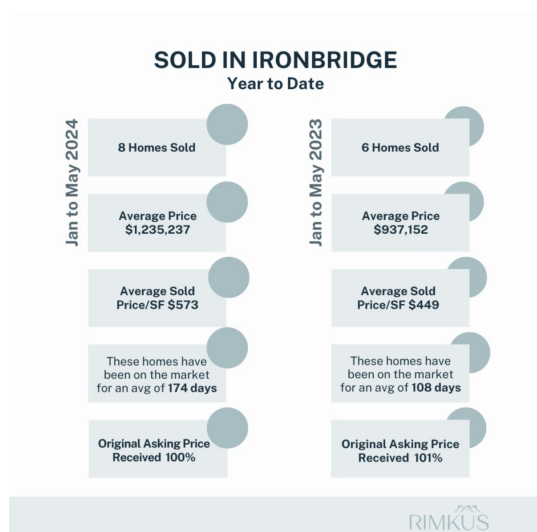
The Ironbridge Golf Club Pool is a private Members Only area.

REAL ESTATE MARKET UPDATE



Market Insights and Trends

As of May 21, 2024, the Ironbridge real estate market is showing robust activity with **five homes currently under contract**. Four of these homes are existing properties that have been on the market for an average of just 14 days, reflecting the strong buyer interest and demand. These homes are priced at an average of \$1,147,600, equating to \$579 per square foot.

Over the past 30 days, **four homes** have sold in Ironbridge, achieving an average sale price of \$1,174,499. Notably, these homes received about 102% of their original asking price, highlighting the competitive nature of the market. The existing homes sold in an average of 54 days, indicating a quick turnaround.

Insights from the Altos Research Report

The latest Altos Research Report provides valuable insights into the **Glenwood Springs** and **Garfield County** markets, emphasizing the significant year-over-year trends:

Inventory Levels: Year-over-year inventory levels in Glenwood Springs have shown a moderate increase, rising by 20%. This increase is notably lower than the Colorado State average, which has seen a 42% increase. This constrained local inventory is a key factor in the valley's pricing dynamics.

Average Price Changes: The median list price in Glenwood Springs for Single Family Homes has risen by 23% year-over-year, now sitting at \$1.745 million. This increase underscores the strong demand, and limited supply driving up property values, and an increase in higher-end & larger homes offered for sale.

Price Cuts: The frequency of price cuts has decreased by 15% year-over-year. This reduction indicates sellers' confidence in the market, with properties being priced more accurately according to market demand, reducing the need for subsequent price reductions.

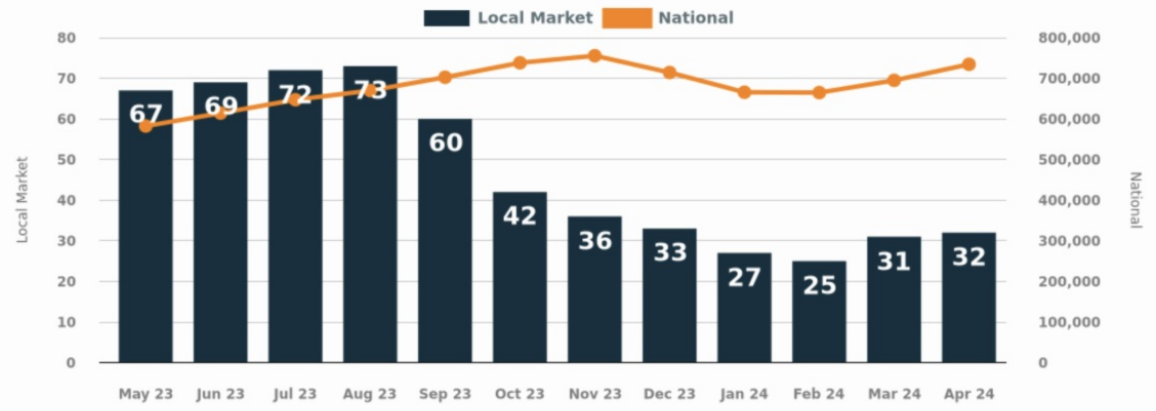


National and Regional Comparison

The contrasting inventory trends between the national and local markets are essential to understanding the current pricing dynamics. While the national inventory has grown substantially, the relatively modest increases in Glenwood Springs and Garfield County have created a tighter market, driving prices upward at a higher margin than seen in other parts of the state and the country.

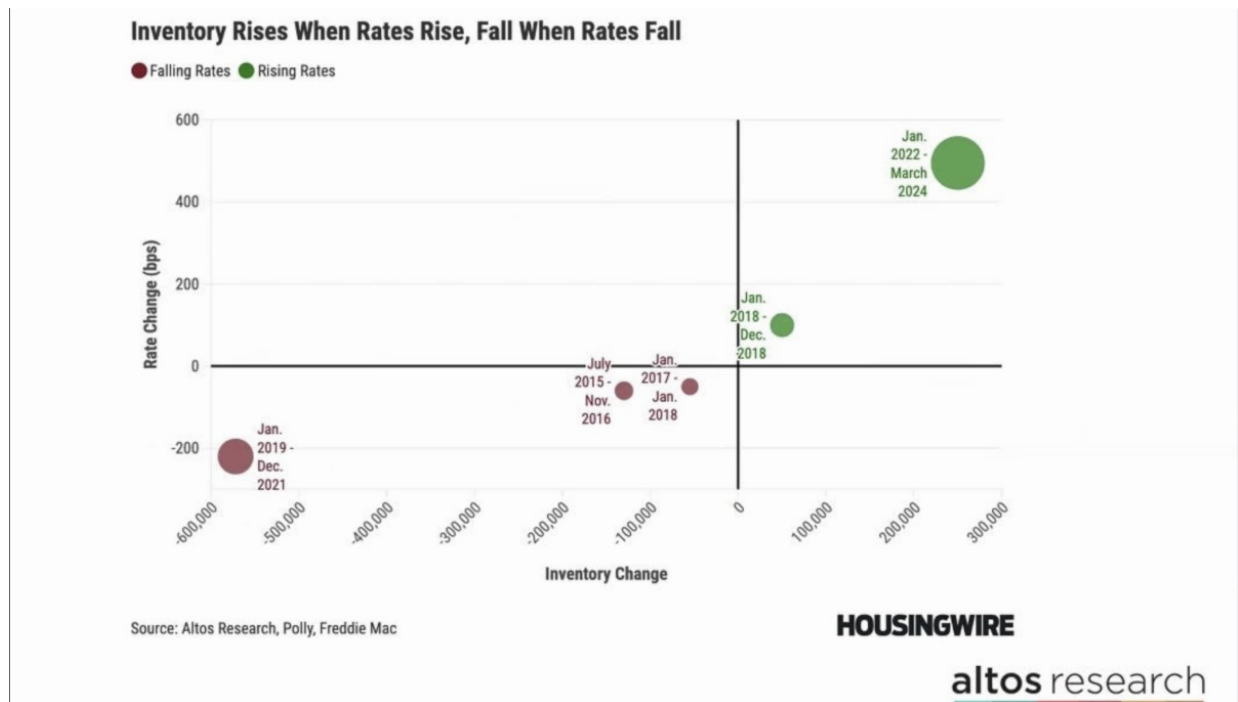

This localized inventory constraint, combined with strong demand, ensures that properties in areas like Ironbridge continue to appreciate, benefiting sellers and posing a competitive environment for buyers.

Conclusion

The Ironbridge real estate market remains a dynamic and competitive arena. The combination of low inventory growth, high buyer demand, and quick turnaround times for property sales contribute to the rising prices and strong market performance. Sellers can take advantage of these conditions to achieve favorable sale prices, while buyers should be prepared for a competitive purchasing environment.

It's also worth noting that interest rates have still not changed significantly recently. Over the months ahead, expectations are varied regarding rate adjustments. If interest rates decrease, it could potentially tighten the already constrained market further. This scenario might lead to even higher property prices due to increased buyer competition. For now, the higher rates provide a unique opportunity for buyers, as it slightly tempers the competitive nature of the market, allowing for the few opportunities to purchase a home.
